5 Elements of Pre-Apprenticeship (Pre-RA)

1. **Connection to existing apprenticeship programs** into which successful pre-apprentices will advance and potentially gain advanced standing
2. **Approved training and curriculum**
3. **Hands-on learning** with a career focus
4. Opportunity to earn an **industry-recognized credential**
5. Access to **support services** and career counseling



Pre-RA Division Priorities

- Raise pre-apprenticeship awareness in the Education community
- Develop more in-depth participant reporting measures to include ways to track successful matriculation from pre-RA to RA
- Create pre-apprenticeship program models consistent with outside agency agendas (OVR, PDE, DHS)
- Raise existing sponsor awareness of programming updates and parameters
- Develop a pre-apprenticeship division which would consist of 2 Pre-Apprenticeship & Training Representatives to focus on program development and registration
- Ensure compliance with regulations, standards, and guidance consistent with PA standards while also considering Act 158: Pathways to Graduation

Pre-Apprenticeship (Pre-RA) Overview

Connection to Registered Apprenticeship

A Pre-Apprenticeship is meant to prepare individuals for a Registered Apprenticeship program.

State Apprenticeship Agency

Pennsylvania follows federal guidelines, and additional policy specific to Pennsylvania.

The ATO requires classroom and hands on learning

The employer and/or Registered Apprenticeship sponsor is ultimate curriculum driver.

Act 158

2023 was the first graduating class able to use successful completion of a pre-apprenticeship program as an alternative pathway to graduation.

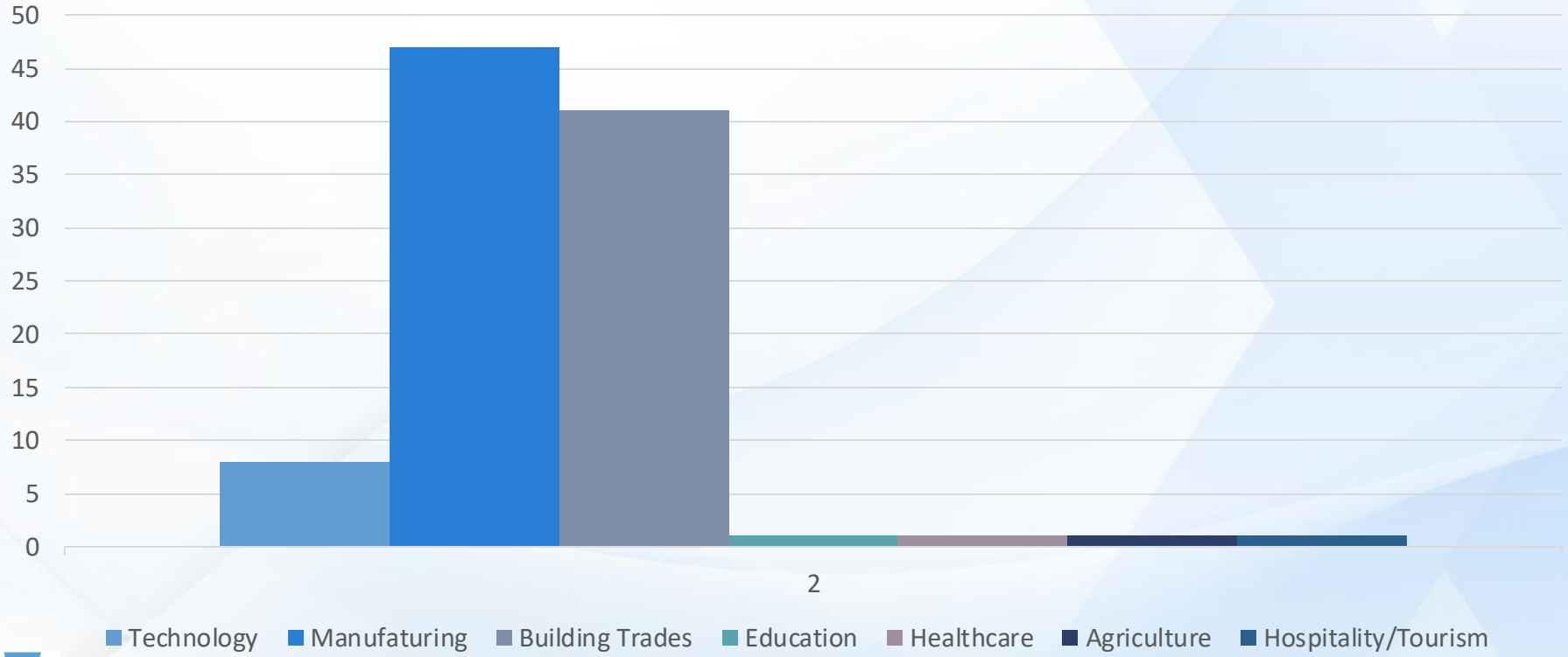
